Program: TOMAK

Duration: 2016 - 2026 (Phase 1: 2016 - 2022; Phase 2: 2022 - 2026)

Funding: AUD\$50 million over 10 years

Partners: Ministry of Agriculture & Fisheries, Ministry of Health, NGOs, private sector

What is TOMAK?

TOMAK is a 10-year, AUD\$50 million Australian Government program which aims to improve food systems in rural communities in Timor-Leste through sustainable agricultural livelihoods. TOMAK is delivered in partnership with the Government of Timor-Leste, NGO and private sector partners.



What will TOMAK achieve?

Food systems consist of everybody and everything involved in bringing food from 'farm to fork'. TOMAK and partners are transforming the food system by improving **food supply chains** (from production to market), enhancing **food environments** (ensuring nutritious food is locally available), and influencing **individual factors** such as household dietary practices. By 2026, TOMAK will address these 3 key outcomes:


Outcome 2: More resilient agricultu

Where does TOMAK work?

TOMAK operates in Baucau, Bobonaro and Vigueque municipalities.



In Phase 1 (2016-2022), TOMAK reached 83 suku. By 2026, TOMAK will reach all 124 suku in Baucau, Bobonaro and Viqueque.

Improved and sustainable government policies, programs and services

TOMAK is committed to capacity development and strengthening of government institutions to deliver improved programs and services to rural communities. This includes strengthening the capacity of Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries (MAF) extension workers to deliver inclusive, nutrition-sensitive services to farmers (including women, youth and persons with disabilities). It also includes improvements to how MAF manages delivery of key veterinary and livestock services.



More resilient agriculture-based livelihoods

Together with government and NGO partners, TOMAK is supporting the development of resilient agriculture-based livelihoods by promoting improved natural resource management at community level, as well as climate-smart agriculture practices for improved production of high potential crops and livestock. The program is fostering greater economic empowerment by establishing community savings and loans groups and supporting farmers to build sustainable links with market actors to sell their produce and invest in agricultural inputs.

Improved household food security and dietary diversity

TOMAK is improving household food security by encouraging farming households to both produce nutritious food and reserve part of their production for year-round home consumption. The program promotes the benefits of a diverse diet for all family members and encourages the use of agricultural income and savings to purchase nutritious food as required.

Leaving no one behind – building an inclusive program

TOMAK includes a particular emphasis on women, youth and persons with disabilities as while these groups face similar challenges to other farmers (limited access to services, markets, and assets) these are compounded by institutional and structural barriers as well as discrimination that prevents them from participating equally in the agriculture sector.
